#### The General Concept



Waste Free Oceans is an industry-led initiative with the aim of reducing floating marine debris on Europe's coastlines and waters by 2020. Using existing fishing trawls and new technology, WFO will engage the Europe's fishing community in cleaning up floating marine debris and bring it back to land for recycling and sorting. The time has come to act together in tackling this growing problem and ensuring the health and purity of Europe's coastal waters.



## Marine Litter Solutions

There are many factors that have contributed to a rise in marine litter: poor waste management practices in ports and marinas, dumping by ships and vessels, not to mention general public attitudes towards littering are all reasons for this growing problem. The implications of an increase in marine litter are far reaching - affecting both human health and the ecosystem. Although this is a global issue it is time for Europe to show leadership in solving this problem.



The Waste Free Oceans Foundation has initiated this marine litter project in order to provide a solution to the problem of floating marine debris.

Boats outfitted with a special trawl will be able to collect between 2-8 tones of waste (per trawl) for cleaning & recycling.
